Summer Assessment

Students from the 1^{st} , 2^{nd} , and 5^{th} years completed summer assessments last week. In addition, 2^{nd} -year students completed standardised tests in Maths and Literacy. We will share feedback from these assessments with you in the coming weeks.

School Policies

The Board of Management and teaching staff review various policies every year. In the past year, the Board reviewed the Admissions, GDPR, Anti-Bullying, Child Safe-Guarding, Litter and Catering policies. The updated policies and all other school policies can be found on the school website here.

Board of Management

The school Board of Management consist of two parents, two staff members and four nominations from the Board of Trustees. The Board meet approximately every six weeks to discuss and review various aspects of the school. The Board creates "Agreed Reports"

from these meetings to summarise topics discussed, and for dissemination to the school community. These agreed reports can be found on the school website <u>here</u>.

School Fee increase

The school does receive a grant from the Department of Education and Skills based on the number of students enrolled, which covers the costs of several teachers. However, all other costs are covered by the school fee. These fees are used to pay for teacher salaries, catering costs, administration costs, building and maintenance costs and transport costs. In the past few years, costs have risen with inflation, so there is now the need to increase the fee. At the recent Board of Management meeting on May 22, the Board agreed to increase the school fee for John Scottus School to €5,775 for the 2023/24 year – an increase of €275 (5%). The catering charge will increase to €630 – an increase of €30 (5%). There is no change in the transport fees. These increases have been kept to the minimum while maintaining the school's high standard of service. For your information, a letter from the treasurer of the Board of Management is being sent along with this newsletter.

Transition Year Update

The Transition Year students had an eventful summer term this year. It started with a new Wednesday module run by Weightlifting Ireland. The fantastic instructors taught our students Olympic power movements using training weights for six weeks.

The TYs have gone to Powerscourt Gardens, Zipit, Emerald Park and Belmont for the Friday modules. The students also worked very hard to create a TY showcase, and they did a fantastic job with everyone playing a part. As part of it, they made a couple of excellent videos summarising what they did over the year.

On the second last week of school, students partook in a social outreach week where they volunteered with a charity for the week. In addition, two of our students stayed in school to create a beautiful mural in the canteen to raise awareness of the UN's sustainable goals, mainly focusing on the goal of life below water.

Uniform Sale

Our Parents Association organised a second-hand uniform sale on May 31. It was a very successful event, particularly for the incoming 1st-year students. The plan is to have another uniform sale somewhere between Halloween and Christmas. I thank all parents who contributed items for the sale and who volunteered to organise the sale.
