Schedule for the week

Thursday, Dec 21

School League Tables

On Tuesday, December 12, the newspapers published the progression data on students going to 3rd-level college. This year, John Scottus appeared with the top progression rate of all schools, with a progression rate of 125% into 3rd-level colleges. The number is greater than 100% as students who deferred places in previous years started in college this year.

Assessment Results

The November assessment results are now available on the student administration system VS Ware. They are the first of the three primary assessments that take place each year. The assessments in each subject assess the learning taking place since the start of the year and indicate learning progress to date.
